


**Quilting Group**

#### **CHRIST CHURCH ORGAN**

Sharp eyed villagers May have noticed that work has recently been carried out on Christ Church organ, this work was to refurbish the 1985 II/P four rank extension organ with a new processor-based switching system, incorporating MIDI facilities.

In February 1984 the village was nearly halfway in the fundraising for the estimated £13,000 to have a new organ built within the case of the old one, using as many old pipes and parts as possible. The organ had been moved from the other end of the church in the 1900's. The original organ was a gift from Viscountess Beresford in 1840.

The Organ Fund launched in April 1982, and by October that year £2,500 had been raised. A long way to go as costs were rising all the while. Several people made interest free loans. Fund raising activities were many and varied! You name it, we did it! The list is endless – does anyone still have Kilndown Tablemats? Or a Kilndown key fob? Ann Olley and the late Betty and Gordon Batchelor put their artistic talents to great use during the fund raising!

In February 1985 the order had been placed. The November issue of the Village Newsletter proclaimed, "WE HAVE MADE IT"! when the organ was dismantled, it became apparent how precarious the whole structure was – Edna Percy the organist at that time may well have descended through the floor with the instrument on top of her.

#### Bus shelter area – as written by Sam Golding in 2000.

'In 1956 the Kilndown Horticultural Society took over the area of ground at the telephone box end of the now Quarry centre. This was a rough piece of land where old farm implements had been dumped and sting nettles and brambles were rampant. The ground was cleared and in spring it was planted with tulips followed by summer bedding. Dame Edith Evans contributed to this project. After a while 'the council' erected the village noticeboard, which caused the flowerbed to be divided by a path. At a later date the notice board was moved to its present position and replaced with the bus shelter (which had previously been at Kilndown Corner on the northbound A21 side outside Nursery Farm). This brought about the end of the flower beds, as people using the shelter walked over the planted beds, which also became strewn with paper etc. The Horticultural Society decided it was a waste of time and abandoned the beds, so now, it has returned to almost the state it was in 1956.'

Lately GPC have maintained the area, with the Quarry Centre Committee carrying out much of the work needed on the shelter but not the flower beds. What with one thing and another, mainly Covid 19, rejigging our lives and to cut a long story short, money the QC acquired from the National Lottery for an event in 2020 has now been allocated to the bus shelter area. The useful, but 'eyesore' salt bin has been moved to a better position, trees and shrubs removed/pruned, and at long last replacement timbers have arrived. There has been some comment on what could be done with the shelter, and this is being considered. In the meantime, we have the preservative, the timber and nails, the ideas for replanting, just need to get on with it now!! It is hoped to raise the bed borders, these have been driven over so many times, they have all but disappeared. Volunteer help will be sought soon!

CHRIST CHURCH FLOWERS Rota for 2024 is now in the church, Ideally, we would like people to sign up for two weeks in a row. We're hoping that the use of floral foam will diminish, however a lot of our vases do not work too well without. Alternatives are chicken wire/ tape/ sand. Come along to our 'demo' and get some ideas on arranging flowers in the church.
